Regulations

Category 3: Emerging Makers Award

This Award recognises emerging makers who are passionate about ensuring that traditional craft skills survive into the future. The award winner could have graduated from full-time studies between 1-5 years ago at the date of application and/or have established a craft or design enterprise in the past 5 years. The Award offers professional support and the opportunity for makers to build their profile at a very early stage in their career.

1. Definitions

- 1.1 **Applicant**: the maker submitting the application whether as an individual or representing an organisation.
- 1.2 **Maker**: an artisan / a craftsperson who has studied and is working in one of the 'List of arts, skills, trades and industries' in the annex.
- 1.3 **Organising Committee:** the committee responsible for the structuring of the competition, receiving and vetting applications as well as organising the exhibition and the Awards Giving Ceremony.
- 1.4 **Selection Committee**: a committee composed of representatives of various Government entities as well as representatives from Crafts and Arts Organisations. The Committee is responsible for the evaluation and assessment of the applications submitted for the competition.
- 1.5 **Organisation:** a public-private partnership as well as public and private organisations.

2. Who can Participate

2.1 All craftsmen/makers living in Malta who have graduated from full-time studies between 1-5 years ago at the date of application and/or have established a craft or design enterprise in the past 5 years and registered with the Registrar of Crafts.

3. Who cannot Participate

- 3.1 Crafts persons who were winners in any previous edition of the award.
- 3.2 Employees of the Malta Crafts Foundation and their family members* are not eligible to apply.
- 3.3 Members of the Selection Committee and their family members* are not eligible to apply.
- 3.4 Makers who have graduated from full-time studies more than 5 years ago at the date of application and/or have established a craft or design enterprise more than 5 years ago.

*For the purpose of this competition, family members means parents, siblings, spouses (including partners in a civil union) and offspring.

4. Application Stage and Validation

- 4.1 Applications close on Monday the 11th March 2024. Late applications will not be accepted.
- 4.2 Receipt of application will be given but this is not proof of validation.
- 4.3 Each application should be from makers resident in Malta who have studied and/or are working in one of the 'List of arts, skills, trades and industries' in the annex.
- 4.4 After the closing date, the Organising Committee will review all applications. In case of an incomplete application, the Applicant will be asked to rectify the application form

- within a specified period of time. If the Applicant does not provide the requested information, the application will be declared as not eligible to participate.
- 4.5 In the case where a large number of applications are received, the Organising Committee reserves the right to ask the Selection Committee to short-list the number of applications before the final evaluation and assessment of the applications submitted for the competition.
- 4.6 With each application, the Applicant is requested to enclose four photos showing the artisan work being produced and a simple 1 pager business plan of the applicant's business. Photos should be in high resolution and in digital format (not scanned).

5. Exhibition

- 5.1 The submitted applications will be part of an exhibition Premju Gieħ l-Artigjanat Malti 2023 on view in any location that the Malta Crafts Foundation may deem appropriate.
- 5.2 Posters with photos and a description of the emergent makers and their work will be showcased during the exhibition Premju Ġieħ l-Artiġjanat Malti 2023.
- 5.3 The Malta Crafts Foundation shall decide on the final setup and placing of the Posters during the Exhibition, and reserves the right not to exhibit any Posters.

6. Complaints and Reports

- 6.1 During the Period of the exhibition, Applicants and the general public can make objections and/or signal any irregularities in participating applications which might be breaching any of the competition regulations.
- 6.2 This can be done on a specific form which will be made available by the Malta Crafts Foundation.
- 6.3 Persons reporting possible irregularities will be asked to substantiate their accusations and quote which of the regulations are being breached.
- 6.4 Officers within the Malta Crafts Foundation will view these reports and make recommendations to the Organising Committee and/or the Selection Committee as required.
- 6.5 Complaints or reports received after the stipulated time will not be considered.

7. Evaluating Criteria

Each application will be assessed on the following criteria:

Good standard of artisan work - 30% of the total mark, allocated as follows

Innovation – 10% Artistic Vision – 10%

Technical Proficiency – 10%

Further the artisan sector and the safeguarding of artisan skills – 10% of the total mark Good business plan – 10% of the total mark

Promising maker: dedication, skill, innovation – 20% of the total mark Level of support needed – 30% of the total mark

8. Prizes

- 8.1 There will be one winner in this category, who will receive a prize of €3000.
- 8.2 The winners will be announced during an awards-giving ceremony held in June/July 2024.
- 8.3 The Selection Committee reserves the right not to award a prize/s if the quality of the applications is not deemed to meet the relevant qualitative criteria.
- 8.4 The decisions taken by the Selection Committee will be considered as final. No appeal shall be admitted in any case. The Selection Committee's deliberations shall remain confidential.
- 8.5 The Malta Crafts Foundation reserves the right to disqualify applicants and/or revoke prizes and/or take any other action it deems necessary, if the Applicant is found to have made a false declaration or did not adhere to one or more of the above regulations. The selection committee may then reconvene in order to re-evaluate applications as applicable with the possibility of re-assigning the award.
- 8.6 The Malta Crafts Foundation will notify the Applicants in advance the date of the event in which the awards are made public. All Applicants agree to be present in this event and must be able to fulfil press requests if any.
- 8.7 In case where an Applicant is unable to attend the awards ceremony, the applicant should inform the Malta Crafts Foundation accordingly and nominate representative/s to attend the ceremony. Details of the representatives being so nominated, who may also receive a prize on behalf of the awarded emerging maker, should include name, designation and ID card number.
- 8.8 The winner needs to give an update to the Foundation on how the money was spent 6 months after the disbursement of funds.
- 8.9 Any promotion carried out after the winning of the prize should always mention the Award itself and tag the Malta Crafts Foundation and Malta Enterprise.

9. Legal Considerations

By submitting an application to this competition, the applicant fully and unconditionally accepts these rules. Violations of these rules may be grounds for disqualifying the Applicant, in which case his or her application will be withdrawn from the competition.

The Malta Crafts Foundation reserves the right to withdraw, suspend, extend or modify the Prize and these Rules of Entry, at any time, without any prior notice in case of any unforeseen circumstances outside its reasonable control or in case of force majeure that may hinder the scheduled procedure of this Prize. No judicial, extra-judicial or any other claim may be brought by the applicants against The Malta Crafts Foundation. Any changes in the Rules of Entry will be published on the Facebook page of the Foundation and/or website. The applicant holds the right to withdraw from participating in case he/she does not agree with the changes made.
